Is Shiloh Springs a private school? In a way, yes. The educational side of Shiloh Springs is under the private school umbrella, better defined as a micro-school. A micro-school is exactly as it sounds, a very small school.

What does it mean that the academic growth is tailored to the student's individual needs rather than constrained by traditional grade levels? This simply means that the teacher will meet the student exactly where they are at and go from there. This may mean the teacher will fill gaps needed to progress learning, or the teacher may take their learning to a higher level than what they would receive in a public school setting. The learning is truly individualized.

Will the mix of age groups work? Yes. The selection of age range was carefully thought through and has been successful in other programs.

Is there a behavior policy? Yes. At Shiloh Springs we believe that children will make child-like choices that can be redirected and talked through. However, we also have policies in place that list out procedures if a student's behavior becomes challenging, including termination of enrollment if necessary.

If I decide to start my child as a "part-time student", but later decide to switch them to "full-time", would this be possible? Yes, we would accommodate that.
